Child and Adult Protection Fact Sheet

Child and Adult Protection Services (CAPS) in the Arapahoe County Department of Human Services provides protective services to children and at-risk adults and seniors following allegations of abuse or neglect. CAPS also provides services to teens with serious conflict and behavioral concerns, and other services that help to create strong and effective families.

Calls to Hotline

Our county crisis hotline at 303-636-1750 and statewide hotline at 1-844-CO-4-KIDS receives calls from community members and mandatory reporters with concerns about the safety and wellbeing of children, youth and at-risk adults, as well as questions about community resources, support services and issues not related to abuse and neglect.

Referrals

Any calls alleging suspected abuse and neglect of a child or at-risk adult, or a youth beyond-control of their parents are generated into referrals. Our hotline workers use enhanced screening for every referral, asking questions to gather as much information as possible about each alleged victim, family and circumstances.

Screening

Every referral is screened through a RED Team (Review, Evaluate and Direct) by a group of highly trained caseworkers, supervisors and managers. We also review the statewide Human Services database for any prior child welfare history as well as the Colorado and Denver Courts databases to determine if there is criminal history that may aid in the decision of whether the referral meets the legal criteria to be assigned for an assessment. Any referrals that do not meet criteria as defined by law are screened out, but the families may be connected with community-based prevention services for additional support.

Assessments

When a referral is assigned, a social caseworker will visit the home and meet with the alleged victim and family to assess safety concerns. Families who are assessed at a low-to-moderate risk level may be offered a variety of community-based intervention services designed to help the family safely and adequately care for their children or adult in the home, without ongoing involvement of the County Department of Human Services.

Children and Adults Served

Families who are assessed at a moderate-to high-risk level may be deemed in need of longer-term services to ensure safety for their children or at-risk adult family member, which may require court involvement, or to aid a family with a youth who is beyond their control or involved with delinquency court. The County can open a case for direct services from our permanency teams until safety concerns are resolved.

Level of Care

In child welfare, our main goal is to help keep families together and children safely at home with their parents or guardians. However, if an assessment finds there is an immediate safety concern in the home that places a child at imminent risk, a child may be removed from the home for his/her own protection and placed by court order in temporary out-of-home care. This could include a certified foster home, licensed group home or treatment facility, or placement with the child’s relatives or kin (individuals in close relationship to the child.) To ensure the child’s safety, the relatives or kin must first pass a state and federal background check before a child is placed in their care. When children are placed in to out-of-home care, it is in their best interest to reunify them with their families as quickly as can be done safely, so as to decrease trauma.

87% of children involved remained safely at home or in the home of their relatives or kin.

472 children served in foster, group or residential facility at any time in the year.

476 children served in relative care at any time during the year.

Adoption: If concerns for a child’s safety and wellbeing cannot be resolved, alternative permanency may be achieved when a child is legally free to be adopted by a ‘forever family.’
